Registering interests

Within 28 days of becoming a member or your re-election or re-appointment to office you must register with the Monitoring Officer the interests which fall within the categories set out in **Table 1** (**Disclosable Pecuniary Interests**) which are as described in "The Relevant Authorities (Disclosable Pecuniary Interests) Regulations 2012". You should also register details of your other personal interests which fall within the categories set out in **Table 2** (**Other Registerable Interests**).

"Disclosable Pecuniary Interest" means an interest of yourself, or of your partner if you are aware of your partner's interest, within the descriptions set out in Table 1 below.

"Partner" means a spouse or civil partner, or a person with whom you are living as husband or wife, or a person with whom you are living as if you are civil partners.

- 1. You must ensure that your register of interests is kept up-to-date and within 28 days of becoming aware of any new interest, or of any change to a registered interest, notify the Monitoring Officer.
- 2. A 'sensitive interest' is as an interest which, if disclosed, could lead to the councillor, or a person connected with the councillor, being subject to violence or intimidation.
- 3. Where you have a 'sensitive interest' you must notify the Monitoring Officer with the reasons why you believe it is a sensitive interest. If the Monitoring Officer agrees they will withhold the interest from the public register.

Non participation in case of disclosable pecuniary interest

- 4. Where a matter arises at a meeting which directly relates to one of your Disclosable Pecuniary Interests as set out in **Table 1**, you must disclose the interest, not participate in any discussion or vote on the matter and must not remain in the room unless you have been granted a dispensation. If it is a 'sensitive interest', you do not have to disclose the nature of the interest, just that you have an interest. Dispensation may be granted in limited circumstances, to enable you to participate and vote on a matter in which you have a disclosable pecuniary interest.
- 5. Where you have a disclosable pecuniary interest on a matter to be considered or is being considered by you as a Cabinet member in exercise of your executive function, you must notify the Monitoring Officer of the interest and must not take any steps or further steps in the matter apart from arranging for someone else to deal with it

Disclosure of Other Registerable Interests

6. Where a matter arises at a meeting which *directly relates* to one of your Other Registerable Interests (as set out in **Table 2**), you must disclose the interest. You may speak on the matter only if members of the public are also allowed to speak at the meeting but otherwise must not take part in any discussion or vote on the matter and must not remain in the room unless you have been granted a dispensation. If it is a 'sensitive interest', you do not have to disclose the nature of the interest.

Disclosure of Non-Registerable Interests

- 7. Where a matter arises at a meeting which *directly relates* to your financial interest or well-being (and is not a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest set out in Table 1) or a financial interest or well-being of a relative or close associate, you must disclose the interest. You may speak on the matter only if members of the public are also allowed to speak at the meeting. Otherwise you must not take part in any discussion or vote on the matter and must not remain in the room unless you have been granted a dispensation. If it is a 'sensitive interest', you do not have to disclose the nature of the interest.
- 8. Where a matter arises at a meeting which *affects*
 - a. your own financial interest or well-being;
 - b. a financial interest or well-being of a relative, close associate; or
 - c. a body included in those you need to disclose under Other Registrable Interests as set out in **Table 2**

you must disclose the interest. In order to determine whether you can remain in the meeting after disclosing your interest the following test should be applied

- 9. Where a matter *affects* your financial interest or well-being:
 - a. to a greater extent than it affects the financial interests of the majority of inhabitants of the ward affected by the decision and;
 - b. a reasonable member of the public knowing all the facts would believe that it would affect your view of the wider public interest

You may speak on the matter only if members of the public are also allowed to speak at the meeting. Otherwise you must not take part in any discussion or vote on the matter and must not remain in the room unless you have been granted a dispensation.

If it is a 'sensitive interest', you do not have to disclose the nature of the interest.

10. Where you have a personal interest in any business of your authority and you have made an executive decision in relation to that business, you must make sure that any written statement of that decision records the existence and nature of your interest.

Table 1: Disclosable Pecuniary Interests

This table sets out the explanation of Disclosable Pecuniary Interests as set out in the Relevant Authorities (Disclosable Pecuniary Interests) Regulations 2012.

Subject	Description	
Employment, office, trade, profession or vocation	Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain. [Any unpaid directorship.]	
Sponsorship	Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from the council) made to the councillor during the previous 12-month period for expenses incurred by him/her in carrying out his/her duties as a councillor, or towards his/her election expenses. This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992.	
Contracts	Any contract made between the councillor or his/her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the

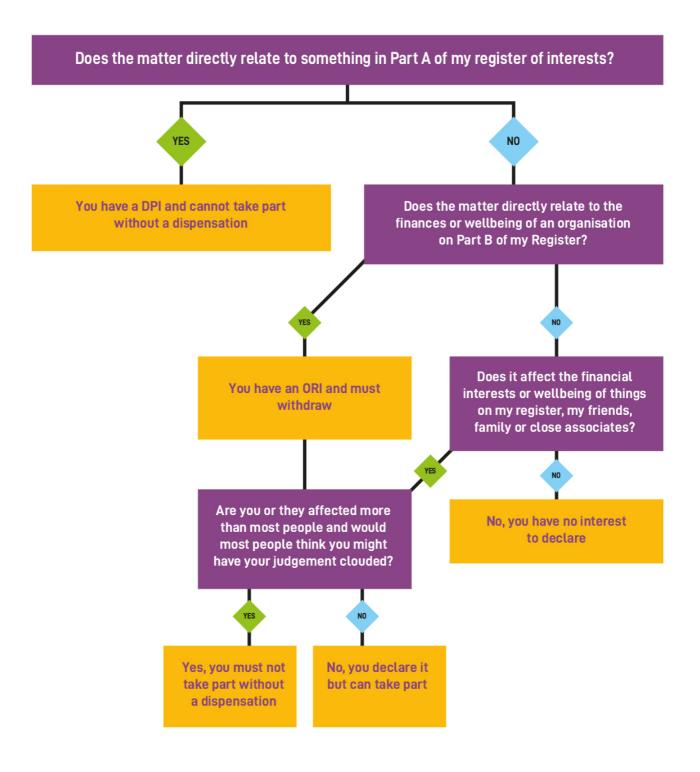

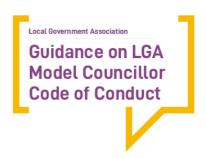

 - (iii) one of whose principal purposes includes the influence of public opinion or policy (including any political party or trade union)

1. Purpose of the report

- 1.1 Following the District Council elections on 4th May 2023, it is necessary to review the political balance of the Council and determine the allocation of seats on committees.
- 1.2 Council's duty is to determine the allocation of seats to be filled by appointments by the authority, except the Cabinet. The purpose is to ensure that there is proportionality across all formal activities of the Council, reflecting the overall political composition. It affects all formally constituted committees, sub-committees, working parties and panels which discharge functions on behalf of the authority.
- 1.3 This report and the accompanying appendix, sets out the political balance of the council and how this is reflected in the allocation of seats on committees, sub committees, working parties and panels.

2. Introduction & Background

- 2.1 On 4th May 2023, following the District Council elections, the political balance of the Council changed. The Council now has the following composition: Liberal Democrats (25 Members), Conservatives (12 Members), Independent Group (3 Members).
- 2.2 Section 15(1) of the Local Government & Housing Act 1989 requires the Council to review the representation of the different political groups on committees and sub-committees:
 - at, or as soon as practicable after the Annual Meeting of the Council or,
 - where notice is received of a change in the composition of political groups
- 2.3 The Head of Paid Service has a duty, whenever such a review takes place, to submit a report to the Council showing what the allocation of seats, in their opinion, best meet the requirements of the above Act.

3. Proposals and Options

3.1 Political Composition

The political composition of the Council is outlined below:

Group	No. of members	%
Liberal Democrat	25	62.5
Conservative	12	30

- 3.2 The Council needs to approve the allocation of seats to the political groups on those committees which are required by law to be politically balanced.
- 3.2 The obligation to ensure that there is proportionality in the political composition of the Council's committees extends only to proportionate representation of members of political groups
- 3.3 In carrying out any review, the Council is obliged to adopt the following principles and to give effect to them 'so far as is reasonably practicable':
 - a) That not all seats on the Council are allocated to the same political group
 - b) That the majority of the seats on the Council are allocated to a particular group if the number of persons belonging to that group is a majority of the authority's membership
 - c) Subject to the above, that the number of seats on ordinary committees of the Council which are allocated to each political group, have the same proportion to the total of all the seats on the ordinary committees of that authority as is borne by the number of members of that group to the membership of the authority and
 - d) Subject to a) and c) above, that the number of the seats on the Council which are allocated to each group have the same proportion to the number of all the seats on that Council as is borne by the number of members of that group to the membership of the Council.
 - e) That following the Annual meeting of Council, delegation should be given to the Group Leaders to make any changes required to appointments to committees, sub-committees, working parties and panels as long as they are in accordance with the political balance. Group Leaders will inform the Democratic Services Manager of any changes members will be notified by email. In addition, and to ensure they changes are recorded formally, an update will be provided to the next meeting of Full Council.

3.4 Entitlement to Places

The table at Appendix A shows provides the entitlement to places of each group. Generally, the approach taken has been to round up percentages where they are above 0.5%. However, in the case of the Independent Group, due to their size, they are not automatically entitled to a seat on all of the main committees. Adjustments to the share of committee seats have therefore been proposed to facilitate this and it is now up to the Groups to negotiate between themselves to finalise the allocations.

3.5 The political balance rules apply to all committees, sub-committees, working parties and panels, unless there is agreement by the Group Leaders and approval by Full Council to waive this requirement.

4. Corporate Priorities

The review of the Council's political balance and approval of the allocation of seats on Committees, sub-committees, working parties and panels must be considered at the AGM of the new administration, so that the business of the Council can continue without impediment, whilst reflecting the political make-up of the Council.

5. Financial and Resource Implications

This is a statutory report and has no financial or resource implications.

6. Legal Implications

This is a statutory report and the Council is required to calculate the political balance and allocate seats in accordance with Section 15 of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 and regulations made thereunder.

7. Risks

If Full Council does not comply with the statutory requirements set out in Section 15 of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 and regulations made thereunder, the core governance functions of the Council cannot operate and decisions cannot be taken.

8. Net ZeroTarget

Although this report and any decisions arising from it do not have direct implications for the Council's Net Zero Target, decisions taken by the Council's committees will have an impact. To ensure that the Council can continue to take decisions in compliance with its targets, the political balance needs to be reviewed and seat allocations need to be approved.

9. Equality, Diversity & Inclusion

The Council's policy has been considered and applied where relevant.

10. Community Safety issues

Not applicable.

11. Conclusion and Recommendations

Following a change in the political balance of the Council, it is necessary to review the allocation of seats on committees, sub-committees, working parties and panels.

- 1. That Council approves the political balance calculation as per section 3.1 of this report
- 2. That Council approves the allocation of seats to political groups as shown at Appendix A
- 3. That following the Annual Meeting of Council, any subsequent appointments to Committees be delegated to the Group Leaders.
